The Information

Law firms are unique in that they handle various types of information. From physical items for estate and family law clients to digital files to databases and hard drives containing hundreds of thousands of files.

Lawyers are governed by ethics rules, which require the lawyer and members of a law firm to

meet certain guidelines with respect to client information. The American Bar Association writes the Model Rules of Professional Conduct and those rules

are adopted, in substantially the same form, by most states.

Note also that the ABA has amended the Model Rules of Professional Conduct for lawyers to specifically require lawyers to maintain
